

# PX Moves To "Pre-Fab Row"


Some 100 Chambley Air Base

# Disaster Firemen Assist French At Crash

Members of the 21st Fighter Bomber Wing Fire Department recently helped further Franco-American relations by assisting French officials at the scene of a railroad disaster near the small community of Jaulny, France.

A slow moving freight train was derailed during the early morning fog of 30 September and its engineer was killed after the train rammed into the rear end of a line of standing boxcars.

An elert switchboard operator in Jaulny placed a call to the Chambley Base Fire Department at 0810 hours. Ten minutes later the local fire fighters, led by Fire Chief WOJG Richard P. Harrington, were on the scene of the accident which occured approximately nine miles from the base.

After coordination with French railroad officials, the base personnel received permission to remove the engineer's body from the tangled wreckage.

## "Operation Caravan" Nearly Completed

With their sights set on 31 October as "Target Date", Captain John J. Pszekaza, Operations Officer of the 862nd Engineer Aviation Battalion, announced this week that "Operation Caravan", the Chambley Air Base Trailer Park Project, was 94.9% completed as of last Friday.

The 862nd, under the command of Major D. E. Gillis, U.S. Army, began "Operation Caravan" on 1 May. Since that time, the hard working men of the Battalion have transformed a "mountain of mud" into a modern Base Trailer Park with 164 families presently occupying trailer spaces.

# 'Desert Rats' Miss USAF Title By Half A Bomb

Members of the 21st Fighter Bomber Wing's Bombing and Gunnery Team, who copped 2nd place honors at the All-USAF Bombing and Gunnery Meet held recently at Nellis AFB, Nevada, will be bringing home six trophies when they return to Chambley Air Base within the next two weeks.

The Desert Ruts missed 1st place by less than the number of points scored for one half a bomb. (Previous reports erroneously stated: "1½ Bombs").

Colonel R. C. Franklin, team commander, took top honors among the pilots of the 21st Wing by carrying-off three trophies. The Colonel took high team captain honors by out-scoring all other team captains of the five participating Major Air Commands. He was also awarded a trophy for accurate bombing and another for accumulating the 3rd overall high score of the entire Meet.

Other trophies went to team members, Major George H. Dodenhoff 1st Lt. Charles E. Adams for 2nd overall high score; and a final trophy to the entire team for having finished the Meet in 2nd place.

Major Dodenhoff returned to Chambley early this week and reported that the 21st Wing was "never out of the contest". He further stated, "Until the last bomb was dropped, the 21st Wing feam was close enough in the scoring to have taken over the top position."

High praises were expressed by Major Dodenhoff for the entire maintenance crew that accompanied the Sabres to the Nevada location. He stated that there were no mechanical mal-functions whatsoever during the entire competition.

Squadron. It has since been Sauadron. brought to our attention that numerous personnel from many units have assisted in this operation, under the direction of an AIO supervisor.


## Two Streets Converted To One-Way

The street running directly in front of the NCO and Airman's Club is now a one-way avenue in the diretion of the main gate. The other one-way drive is located one block to the west running parallel and in the opposite direction of the road in front of the pre-fabs.

Captain Davis stated that the short streets which connect the two one-way thoroughfares are still open for two-way traffic.

Numerous French traffic signs have been placed conspicuously along the affected streets to help inform motorists of the new one-way policy.



# Desert Rats Edge Toul 7-6; Les "Rats" Mordent Hold Second In France Conference Les "Royals"

The Chambley Desert Rats held on to their second spot in the France Conference by the slim margin of one point last Saturday by holding Toul Rosieres Air Base to one touchdown after taking an early 7 - 0 lead o-

The Desert Rats looked to be the stronger of the two teams during the first quarter when Hardison, Jack Demarris, and Bill Kennedy repeatedly slashed through the Toul line, but they were unable to

The tide of battle changed with the advent of the second quarter as Toul's pass offense picked up momentum. Alternating end runs and short passes, Toul moved into scoring position twice, but was unable to push it across. The half ended with Chambley ahead seven to

nothing.

Toul kicked to Virgil De Armond to start the second half, and the big end returned it almost to the mid-field stripe. Chambley started moving then as AL Foreman and Ray Jackson took pitch-outs for a first down, but a holding penalty set the Desert Rats back 15 yards and they were forced to punt.

Toul returned the punt to their own 20 yard line and started a slow drive toward the opposite goal. One spectacular reverse was good for 75 yards and a TD, but was called back on a clipping penalty. With two yards to go and fourth down on their own 48, the Panthers elected to gamble and made a first down. On the next play a flat pass was carried to the Chambley 18, and six more plays saw the Toul quarterback

Most traffic accidents don't happen, they are caused. All too many of our automobile accidents are caused by drivers who hurry along the road at excessive rates of speed, ignoring both traffic control signs and basic rules of good judgement.

Accidents resulting from such flouting of the law are certainly inexcusable and they show that a great part of our annual traffic toll could be wiped out if people would heed the signs provided for their protection.

All motorists should know French traffic signs by their shapes and should heed them on sight.

Lt. Colonel Martin F. Peters, 21st Wing Ground Safety Officer has stressed the importance of driving at speeds safe for conditions. Limited visability, whether by weather conditions or obstructions, is not covered by traffic signs. There is no

substitute for good judgement.

The following news article. concerning last Saturday's football game between Chambley and Toul-Rosieres, has been condensed and translated, by Mme. Genevieve Hartman, from EST REPUBLICAIN, Nancy, France, 9 October 1955:

LES "RATS" DE CHAMBLEY MORDENT LES "ROYALS" DE TOUL-ROSIERES (THE CHAMBLEY "RATS" BITE THE TOUL-RO-SIERES "ROYALS").

"Who do you think is the champion of American football? It is the photographer whenever he manages to get the ball into a picture. This really is a success, since that famous ball is for some reason never to be seen during the game.

"Full of pep, like a kid coming back from vacation, the American football season in Nancy opened Saturday afternoon at the Pepiniere Stadium.

"The Toul-Rosieres team, the Royals, were facing the team of Chambley, the Desert Rats ("Les Rats du Désert" in French), a nickname which is very eloquent in the case of a game which consists of biting away every inch of the adversary's space.

"Lively and colorful, the game was going on in two places; on the field, occupied by 26 well disciplined men (22 players and 4 umpires) and by the tribunes shouting and resounding with the noise of hand clapping, all kinds of horns, firecrackers and other things used by spectators to support their team. Going by the tremendous impression each of the players makes on you, one would wonder whether any support is needed at all.

You should not believe, however, that the public was composed of people entirely from the other side of the Atlantic. There were also a great many people of Nancy and, just as they do at their beloved game of soccer, they were not the last to manifest their disapproval of an umpire's decision. The American spectators were behaving, on the whole, much more quietly.

"Despite real effort on the part of the Royals, the Chambley team brought home another victory (7-6)."
