



Sergeant New's Inventions Show Vast Saving Of USAF Dollars

It seems like the men of the 72nd Fighter Bomber Squadron have a Thomas Edison type inventor within their midst, whose name is T/Sgt Jesse G. New. Sergeant New, Sergeant New. hails from Minden who La., has been with the 72nd for nearly two years now and since coming overseas has devised four different inventions to improve on equipment for jet aircraft.

The four devices Sergeant New has constructed are: 1. A dolly (see cut) for removal and installation of tail pipe sections of F-86 type aircraft. Whereas previously it required three men for this task, it now requires only one man. 2. aft section. 3. Bungee for securing flexible lines on J-47 engines during removal and installation of the engine. 4. Last but not least, a landing gear suspension hanger which is primarily a safety device when greasing or removing a landing gear.

USAF Headquarters Approves New 416th Squadron Emblem

The Awards Branch, Personnel Services division of USAF Headquarters in Washington recently approved the organizational emblem of the 416th Fighter Bomber Squadron. Designed originally by Major George A. Dodenhoff (USMC) and several squadron officers, it supercedes the emblem approved in 1944 when the squadron was designated as the 416th Night Fighter Squadron, Army Air Forces.

The significance of the emblem depicts an interesting parallel between ancient and



modern warriors. Just as the Knights of Old rode into battle on their trusty steeds, so do today's jet pilots ride their silver jets against the enemy.

A knight, while symbolizing a jet fighter pilot, connotates strength and goodness; a champion and one with combat potential. Alone on his stallion, he is quite similar to a jet pilot alone in his cockpit, winging his way through the skies.

The horse represents a jet plane and implies readiness and mobility with its raised hoofs. The stallion also connotates confidence with his chest stuck out and aggressiveness stems from his eyes and determined mouth.

The armor in which the knight is arrayed represents the armor which his jet plane provides and also symbolizes the firepower with which he is equipped. His helmet is similar to that worn by a jet pilot on a mission. The yellow plume atop the helmet symbolizes victory in battle and implies success, daring and leadership.

His blue cape, on which there are 25 white stars, symbolizes his area of operations - the heavens. Carried in his right arm is the symbol of the squadron's mission - a lance. The lance is indeed a unique and special weapon associated with knights and represents

Masonic Lodge News



Kincheloe Scores Winning Goal In Final About Chambley And Sports

Seconds As Chambley Edges SHAPE, 62-61

Outside the Suresnes Army Gymnasium in Paris last weekend the temperatures hovered around the mid-thirties. But inside the leaky roof "coliseum", where the undefeated Chambley Desert Rats were encountering the SHAPE Indians cage squad in a France Conference Basketball twin-bill, everything was intensely hot—especially the tempers of the cagemen on the court. Coach H. C. Hartwig's Chambley cagers won the first game of the scheduled double header last Saturday by a slim six point margin, 59-53. In Sunday's contest Chambley's Jerry Kincheloe wrote a dramatic story-book ending to one of the most bitterly fought games of the season, as he potted the winning marker in the final four seconds of the game. giving of the season, as he potted the winning marker in the final four seconds of the game, giving Chambley a 62-61 victory edge.

In the first game, Chambley guard Jim Fields grabbed high scoring honors with 29 markers, followed by Dave Mc Allister, Indian forward, who netted 15 points. Forwards Bob Sisk and Cecil Voils turned in impressive performances for the Desert Rats, as both dropped 10 tallies through the nets.

Sunday's battle was a seesaw O. affair from the initial jump, with neither squad being able to gain more than a six point lead at any time during the contest. At half-time the score was knotted 30 -30, and at one point, late in the second half, Chambley's chances looked hopeless, with the SHAPE-men ahead 54 - 48. The Descrt Rats were able to narrow the margin to a single point, but with just 10 seconds left on the clock, SHAPE "froze" the ball.

As the seconds ticked away, so did Chamb'ey's chances. With only five searnds left to play. Kincheloe intercepted a SHAPE pass at mid-court, drove for the basket, and the ball left his fingers and dropped through the nets as the gun sounded, ending the game.

The Suresnes Gumnasium turned to bediam as Chamblev fans and teammates rushed to the court to Officials, congratulate Kincheloe. Paul Whitmore and Chuck Snyder. deliberated for 15 minutes after the final oun, checking the scorebook of the game. When it was finally decided that there was way in the world to award the game to the SHAPE five, the seferees declared the results "offi-

Kincheloe was high scorer of the game with 22 points. Fields accounted for 16 tallies. while Voils and Chamblev guard Leif Carlson each pushed through 10 markers. Mc Allister scored 18 points the SHAPE auintet.



"An indelible mark has been imprinted on many a page of the 12th Air Force sports records by the Chambley Desert Rats. This is a noteworthy fact, when one stops to consider that the 21st Fighter Bomber Wing has been in Europe for slightly more than a year, and during this comparitively short time, they have blazed a path of sports maturity throughout the command.

Chambley's baseball team started the ball rolling by winning 17 games and dropping only eight. Coached by T/Sqt Harry Chrisman, the Chambley nine wound up the season in third place, behind the league champs from Chaumont and the second place Etain team. In the post season All-Star game between the France and German baseball conferences, Chambley was ably represented by Lynn R. Heintz at first base and Donato Dapolito at second, while Coach Chrisman was selected as mentor of the France All-Stars.

As the gloves, bats and balls were being packed away, new activity was brewing on the field near the 72nd hangar. It was August and the 1955 football season was on its way. This was to be the 21st Wing's initial football eleven to take part in 12th Air Force competition, and Coach, Colonel Herbert C. Hartwig, utilizing previous professional experience, led his gladiators through a successful (4-2-2) season. Once again the Desert Rats' coach was selected to lead the France All-Star squad against their German contemporaries. Jim Hamby, Don Smith, Virgil DeArmond, and Ray Jackson also represented Chambley's pigskinners in the December 10th All-Star tilt, which ended in a 13-13 deadlock.

Even before the All-Star
