

Section News Command

With the easing of the extremely cold weather experienced during the past weeks, the construction of certain base facilities is again under way.

In the past, there have been many questions asked as to when certain of these facilities are going to be available. Of course, much still depends on the weather and other conditions; however, certain dates are firm enough now so that a reasonable estimate can be given.

The base theatre, for which everyone has been waiting for so long, will be opened on or before the 15th of April. The theatre will be nicely furnished on the inside and will have regular theatre-type seats plus a sloping floor.

The AFEX Snack Bar, located in the prefab next to the NCO Club, is nearing completion and will also open on or about the 15th of April. The German contractors, working for AFEX, have done an extremely fine job on the interior of the building and it will be a facility that we will all be proud of.

The permanent service club has approximately two more weeks of contractor work yet to be done. At the conclusion of this work, the base will contract for the tiling of the floor. At the same time, the other contractors hired trough the Central Base Fund will move into the building and begin the installations of drapes, sound system, and other items necessary for the club. Furniture for the club has been purchased and is awaiting pick up in the Aschaffenburg Depot.

Furniture for the day rooms for each of the barracks was purchased some weeks ago. Just about the time that the manufacturer shipped the items, the heavy freeze hit and the French roads were barred to our heavy vehicles by imposition of thaw barriers. The roads are beginning to open again and we can expect delivery of these items

beginning to open again and we can expect delivery of these items within the next three weeks.

One item of great concern is the overall appearance of the base. Over the past weekend a great deal of effort was put forth by Air Base Group and M&S Group in cleaning up their areas. However, a great deal remains to be done. Unit commanders are failing to maintain the appearance of the areas surrounding their shops, hangars, and barracks. If areas are not properly maintained, there will be no alternative but cease work for several days and have a general base clean up

work for several days and have a general base clean up.

The Air Installations Squadron is prepared to do a certain amount of grading work throughout the base. This work will proceed on schedule and cannot be interfered with. To facilitate the work, it is requested that trash, beer cans, and other debris be cleaned up.

Residents of the trailer park are again reminded that it is their responsibility to clean the area surrounding their trailers.

Thousands of Phone, Radio, Teletype Messages Handled Daily by Personnel of 21st Wing Communications Center

During a normal work day at Chambley, the various telephones throughout the base are used approximately 5,000 different times. The compact and simple looking object that sits on your desk is, needless to say, one of our most rapid means of communication. Yet, how many of us consider it only another convenience, never stopping to realize what a vast network of activity preceded the ring of your phone?

Your long distance call, for example, to Ramstein or Evreux is normally processed in less time than it takes to call from San Francisco to Los Angeles. Naturally, complications will arise occasionally whereby calls cannot be completed as auickly. In the majority of cases, however, little time is required in phoning any military installation in Western Europe.

This daily operation is performed by 11 French Civilian girls with S/Sgt Lyndell L. Mundy as NCOIC. The girls work on four shifts - from 0800 to 1700, from 1600 to 2400, and from 2400 to 0800, while the remaining shift is off duty. These girls handle up to 700 calls per hour during peak periods of the day.

Another important segment of the Comm operation is the Base Message Center. Their job consists of sending and receiving all TWX (Teletypewriter Exchange) messages This section, under the direction of S/Sgt Horold R. Dorsey, handles approximately 100 TWX messages per day.

T/Sgt Harvey L. Willett is NCOIC of the Telephone Maintenance Section. Sergeant Willett and his crew of 11 airmen are responsible for installing all telephones and cables on the base. They also do repair work on the Comm Center switchboard, and they take care of all long distance lines for AACS and Weather units at Chambley.

In the operations section, S/Sgt Robert H. Sindorf is responsible for

processing all correspondence and paperwork pertinent to the Communications setup. Included among his tasks is a periodic reaccom-plishment of the base telephone

MARS Radio and High Frequency Radio are also operations handled by the 21st Comm Squadron. The High Frequency department is used primarily for weather and regular messages. The MARS station is available, free, to all personnel to use in making reservations at hotels or to call friends elsewhere in Europe. Messages to the States must be routed through Germany.

The MARS outfit has been handling in the vicinity of 50 hotel reservations per month. There are four radio operators and one mechanic in this section with S/Sgt Forest L. Jones serving as NCOIC.

Overseers of the entire Communications Operation are, Major James B. Stapleton, Wing Commu-

nications Officer; Major Elburn R. Oxner, Comm Squadron Commander; and Captain Peter Stricker, Operations Officer and Squadron Adjutant.

As you can see, your telephone call to Ramstein, your radio message to Garmisch, or your TWX to Chateauroux all entail an extensive operation. However, this operation is performed smoothly by the 21st Communications Squadron - A vital unit which contributes immensely to the efficient operation of the 21st Wing, and thereby to the efficiency of the entire Air Force.

French Customs Documentation Required for Private Vehicles

Hear Ye, Hear Ye! Now is the time for all good men to come to the aid of their driving privileges!

The following are excerpts from COM Z circular 190-10, entitled, "Registration and Operation of Privately Owned Vehicles." It is information regarding important your French Customs Documenta-tion, the Carnet de Passages en Douane.

"It is mandatory that owners of vehicles other than those bearing permanent French license plates, or those which have not been imported into France duty free, possess valid customs document. Failure to renew an expired customs document will pired customs document will automatically suspend the privilege of operating a register-ed vehicle and the owner will immediately surrender his gasoline ration permit and his CF registration plates to his unit commander.

"The unit commander will void the gasoline ration permit and will return the registration plates to the regist registrar". motor

In addition to the above, another helpful and necessary fact is that the customs docu-

ment is valid only for a one year period, beginning from the day you receive it, to the date you will find at the top

of the document.

Take a look at yours; if you see that it has already expired, or that the expiration date is fast coming due, here is what you do:

Run to the base Post Office and purchase a P.M.O. made out to "Registrar of Motor Vehicles, APO 58, US Army", for the amount of \$9.35. With this, along with your old Carnet, report to Pass and Registration where they will gladly process the necessary papers for renewal.

Sports Trophies To Be Presented Soon


Trophies will be presented in the near future, to the various first and second place winners of the Chambley intra-mural athletic competition.


