

"Let's take your reserve obligation first. When you are returned to the ZI for release from active service, you will be assigned to the Ready Reserve, which means you will be subject to call to active duty during any emergency proclaimed by the President. You will be in a pool of tech-nicians that will be assigned to units, without requiring any training or participation on your part."

"Will I get paid or have training of any sort?"

"You can apply for assignment to an active reserve unit and be placed in a pay status, but then you will be required to participate in reserve meetings and meet minimum requirements.

"How much would I get paid?"

"You would receive a day's

pay for every four hour training period you attend."
"How many training periods do I have to attend?".
"There are several ways training is conducted; nights, weekends or tours of active duty. You can participate in any type training that is convening type training that is convenient to you. Generally you need to attend 35 days of training each year."

"Sounds pretty good and I can probably use the extra money".

Other points of discussion were: the mandatory wearing of jackets in the base theater during the summer months; slow service in the barber shop, and failure of the management to utilize numbered cards to avoid confusion; and the possibility that screen doors could be acquired for barracks during summer months.

Armed Forces Day Prayer


The following prayer was written by the Armed Forces Chaplains Board in recognition of Armed Forces Day, tomorrow.

"Almighty God, on this Armed Forces Day, we give Thee thanks for all those who, by their sacrificies and devotion to duty, have made our heritage of freedom secure. The bake sale held Wednesday morning proved highly successful.


June Carnival Plans Announced by AYA
