Col Rowland will introduce



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Career Counseling Center Offers Information about GI Benefits

(Editors Note: This is the second of a series of articles dealing with an actual conversation between S/Sgt Robert N. Mayo, Career Counseling NCO, and an airman who is assigned to Chambley Air Base. Reserve obligations of personnel after discharge were discussed in the first installment.)

"When we started our con- "Yes."

"When we started our conversation, John, you had another question, what was it again?"

"Yes, what GI benefits do I have if I want to go to school after completing my tour in the Air Force."

"You can attend a full time course and draw \$110 per month as a single man or attend part-time courses with reduced pay, at any VA approved school. One thing to remember is to be sure when you enroll in a course that it is VA approved and it is what you want, since you will only be allowed one change in your educational program."

"I may not go to school anyway, but you said you had some figures on how much I would earn, can you show them to me?"

"Sure, John, as a matter of fact, we get the Employment and Earnings book from the US Department of Labor each month. It has current figures on employment and earnings on employment and earnings of employees working on an hourly basis in all industries in every state in the nation. I'm sure we can find your job in it".

"Say, this is a civilian publication, so I guess it won't be shaded to make me reenlist."

"That's right, we want you to get a true picture to help you make your own decision. Here we are, Hours and Gross earnings of production workers manufacturing, by major industry group, during January 1956, in fabricated metal products. A worker worked 41.1 hours, with a weekly wage of hours, with a weekly wage of \$83.43 before taxes. That is the national average. In your state (Calif) it was \$87.32 for a 40.7 hour week, which is above the national average. Your home is in San Bernardino, right?"



"Here is a breakdown for that city area and it is \$84.76 for a 40.4 hour week, which is still above the national average. So lets just suppose you will earn \$85.00 a week prior to taxes."



There are several advantages connected with membership in the organization. First, through the club, tours will be made to various European camera factories. This will allow members to learn the intricate process required in manufacturing cameras.





To do justly, love mercifully, and walk humbly".



Desert Rats Drop Doubleheader to Chaumont; Chance Trims Etain Twice

The Chaumont Mudhens soared into first place in the Eastern Conference France baseball standings last weekend by defeating the Chambley Desert Rats, 9-2 and 11-4, in a pair of contests played on Chaumont's home grounds.

Chambley had gained an undisputed lead in the league standings one week earlier when Bob "Iron-Man" Chance won both ends of a double-header, 2-1 and 8-6, from the Etain Pioneers. The double victory at Etain gave the Rats a 4 - 0 won and loss record in conference activity.

Last weekend's twin shellacking at Chaumont pushed Chambley into a second place tie with the Pioneers, since both

clubs now have a 4 - 2 record. The Mudhens have suffered a single defeat, while five.

Big John Martin, southpaw hurler of the Mudhens, turned in a magnificent mound performance in last Saturday's series opener. He struck out 18 Chambley batters and allowed only two hits. Between the third and seventh innings, Martin whiffed 11 out of 12 Desert Rats in succession.

Chambley drew first blood in the game, when Donato Dapolito walked, on four pitches in the initial frame, after Al Foreman had gone down swinging. "Dap" moved to second on a passed ball and scored when Cantrell Brown sent a sizzling



double to right. The threat died, however, as Lynn Heintz flew to center and Tom Wilks was called out on strikes.

The Hens pushed across two runs in their half of the first on one hit, a walk, and a pair of Chambley errors.

Chambley tied the score in the third when Foreman led off with a walk, stole second and scored

on an error. The Chaumont nine went ahead again in the bottom of the third, scoring one run on three hits — topp Chuck Jones' double. topped-off by

For all practical purposes, that was the ballgame. Only two Chambley runners reached base after the third inning and both died on first.

The Desert Rats didn't score until the fifth, when Chance sent a pinch-hit single to right after two were out. Foreman followed with a single, scoring Chance, and Wilks doubled to left, sending Foreman across the plate. The rally died a moment later when Wilks was nailed at home while trying to score from second on Brown's hit into left field.

Harris relieved Brown in the bottom of the fifth and performed exceptionally well. In the top of the sixth, Harris accounted for Chambley's final two runs with a 340 foot blast over the right field fence, after Dick Ewers had walked. Harris' clout was the only four-bagger of the

The Hens annexed two more runs on three successive singles in the bottom of the eighth. Brown was charged with the loss, his first against no wins, and Schoolboy Folsom got credit for the victory.

Chance's doubleheader victory over Etain, on May 27, gave him a 3-0 won and loss record for the season. Big Bob allowed only five hits in the first game, missing a shutout when the Pioneers scored on an error in the second frame.

Sylvester Ford started on the mound for Chambley in the nightcap. He was relieved by Chance, with the score tied, 1-1, after two and 2/3 innings.

Etain scored one run in the fourth and three in the sixth to grab a 6-2 lead. The Rats knotted the score again, with four runs, in their half of the sixth when Wilks, Luis Salcido, Chance and Foreman all hit safely.
