Personal appearance engagements have taken the band to England, France, Germany, Africa, Egypt, Saudi Arabia and every corner of the continental United



# Ten Pakistan Airmen Visit Chambley For 12 Week Tour of Temporary Duty

Ten enlisted men of the Pakistan Air Force arrived at Chambley Air Base on November 13 for a 12 week tour of temporary duty here, during which time they will study and work with jet engine mechanics and maintenance personnel of the 21st Wing. This plan is being sponsored by the U.S. State Department's Military Aids and Assistance Program to Pakistan.

A/1C William R. Gardiner Jr., of the 72nd Fighter-Bomber Sq, is presently holding daily classes of instruction in the operation of the J-47-GE-27 jet engine for eight of the Pakistan men. The classes include instructions in theory, construction and maintenance of the jet engine, as well as the study of the complete aircraft systems. # **USAFE Announces** Second Quarterly Promotion Quota

WIESBADEN, Germany (Special) — A quota of 5,727 promotions for USAFE airmen for

the second quarterly cycle was announced here recently by USAFE Personnel officials.

The quota, 9.1 per cent less than the first quarterly cycle, is part of 61,269 new stripes alletted in the Air Force. allotted in the Air Force.

Hikes in the USAFE quota include 45 to master sergeant, 141 to technical sergeant, 877 to staff sergeant, 2,669 to airman first class and 1,995 to airman second

Airmen advancing to master sergeant, technical sergeant and staff sergeant must go against an Air Force and USAFE freeze list in order to get their next stripe.

The process of freezing promotions is the Air Force's effort to and shortages overages into balance. Overstrength skills are kept frozen until attrition (separations, deaths, retirement, etc.) and retraining cuts down the surpluses. Then they can be opened.

Theoretically, hikes will reopen when these overages are reduced. Frozen skills can be opened, technically, when manning falls below the 100 per cent mark.

There is no freeze on AFSCs for A/1C and A/2C.

## Education Center Provides 'Three R's' To 21st Fighter-Bomber Wing Personnel by Cornelio de Kanter

One of the facts that is least emphasized on the recruiting posters of the Armed Forces is that a man can continue his

education while serving. In one of the most astonishing programs being offered in any military installation of the USAF, a desperate attempt is being made to increase the educational level of its personnel to the point where they can readily understand and follow the complicated structure and mechanical know-how required to maintain an efficient force.

During recent years the concept of atomic defense and offense has become an integral part of the Armed Forces thinking. We have an immediate striking power rea-dy now, not an hour or a day from now, but at a second's notice.

This demands that every member of the Armed Forces know his duty and his part in the overall machine of defense. His duties, responsibilities, and rights are all contained in official, semi-official, and completely informal publications. There is no way that a man in the Armed Forces of this day and age can remain abrest of the demands laid upon his special technical skills unless he can read and understand these publications.

Increasingly, promotions among the airmen, and of late promotions to the higher ranks of officers, are based upon the man's academic background, since it is only those men with sufficient knowledge, no

matter where attained or how, who can remain a part of the defense

Education in the Armed Forces has increasingly become a matter based not only on actual academic years of schooling, but rather a measure of a man's ability to deliver and produce within his own career field.

On every base there is an active Education Center, su-



This month the AACS celebrated its 18th birthday. Some of you will ask, "What is this AACS anyway — some Ack Ack outfit?" Some have heard that it means "Always Away Co-ordinating Something." Others believe that it means 'Acres and Acres of Chambley Sugar.

AACS stands for the Airways and Air Communications Service. it stands for the guys who spend the long grave-shift hours in Control Towers, Air Traffic Centers, GCA Units, Weather Teletype Sec-tions and Comm Centers on bases all over the world. It stands for the maintenance man, the clerk, the supply man — the guys who make the wheels of organizations turn.

Our job is to control air traffic and to furnish services like beacons and radar sets to help the birds get home. We help get weather info to them, and stand ready to hit the panic button for the whole base if one of those birds is in trouble.

We can call up the Air Re-

we can call up the Air Rescue people for them if they go down, and help co-ordinate a scarch. We do these things for the Base Commander, because they are his responsibilities and he has turned the job over to us.

We've got quite a history. It goes back through every major action of the Air Force to 1934. AACS men have been doing this kind of work for 18 years at every base the birds have been flown



sions of an American Air Base, the Pakistan Airmen reported that they enjoying their stay here. American prices, how-ever, are extremely high when ever, are extremely high when compared to their prices back home. In the Pakistan Air Force, a complete uniform costs only \$12.00, a pair of shoes — \$2.00 and a pack of cigarettes — 4c. A lance corporal in the Pakistan Air Force (the equivalent of our staff sergeant) makes \$40.00 per months — whether he's married or not.

According to Gardiner, the toughest job in conducting a class is when it's time for roll call. The roll call roster includes such names as, (you pronounce them) Khann, Akbar, Udin and Querschi.

"Many of these men served in the Indian Army during World War II," said Gardiner, "and I feel that Pakistan is one of our closest allies today."
